

The first one will be installed at Desoto State Park sometime this year. These displays will provide information about soils, geology, water and other natural resources to the public and invite them to learn more.

We are planning a Tri-State SWCS conference on water conservation with the Georgia and Florida Chapters. Current plans are to have it on St. George Island in mid-May. CPESC NEWS ... Erosion and Sediment Control News

The Red Water Blues Field Days for 2006 are history and were quite successful. With no hurricanes, the events were held as scheduled at Tuscaloosa on September 14 and Auburn on September 28. Each event set an attendance record for our field days - approximately 150 at Tuscaloosa and 160 at Auburn (exceeding the largest attendance in prior years of 135 at Birmingham in 2004). We were pleased with the practices that were available for viewing and believe that everyone that attended should have increased their knowledge about the use and installation of erosion and sediment control practices and products. In addition to site visits in the morning, presentations were made after lunch on Stormwater Construction Regulations and Installation of Rolled Erosion Control Products.

The Field Guide for Erosion and Sediment Control on Construction Sites in Alabama was available for participants at the end of the day. Special thanks to the local field day sponsors: Tuscaloosa and Lee County Soil and Water Conservation Districts, Tuscaloosa County Commission, Tuscaloosa County Parks and Recreation Authority, City of Northport, City of Tuscaloosa, S. T. Bunn Construction Co, Smith and Smith Home Builders, Home Builders Association of Tuscaloosa, Auburn Research and Technology Foundation, City of Auburn, Auburn University (College of Agriculture, Agricultural Experiment Station, Ag Heritage Park,), Lee County Commission, Jones and Mear Homebuilders, Lee County Home Builders Association and Piedmont Fertilizer Company.
